From the Historian's Desk...

Hello from your Town Historians Bob & Beth Wilson

GRIST MILL STONE

This summer with the water line installation was taking place near Byron Road and Tower Hill Road there was a grist mill stone found. Our wonderful Byron Highway Superintendent David Leaton was able to recover this stone in its original shape.

In 1814, just at the close of the war of 1812, Asa Williams built the first grist mill in Byron, located on Spring Creek, about half a mile west of now North Byron. It is believed that the stone was picked up in the neighborhood, and modeled out to suit. After this time, they got along very well for grinding. Before that they had to travel all the way to Churchville.

At the heart of the gristmill are the grinding stones. There are two stones, an upper and a lower stone. Each stone is 4 to 6 feet in diameter, 18 to 24 inches thick and they weighed as much as a ton. Millstones were made of ordinary granite or sandstone, quarried so each stone is a single piece.

A grist mill was used to grind corn, oats and wheat into much needed flour. When the mill was not being used for grinding, they would use it as a saw mill.





The above information was gathered from "The Pioneer Story" of Asa Merrill Addressed by him to the Genesee County Pioneer Society for its Annual Meeting in 1872. Also looking at old maps of Byron.
